I-914 Petition for T Nonimmigrant Status

Dear USCIS Officer:

I am filing an I-914 Petition for T Nonimmigrant Status as a victim of severe human trafficking pursuant to the Immigration and Nationality Act ("INA") section 101(a)(15)(T). My supplemental documentation supports all requirements that a T nonimmigrant status petitioner must prove under the INA. The requirements for a T visa are as follows: (1) the applicant has been a victim of severe form of trafficking in persons; (2) the applicant is physically present in the U.S. on account of trafficking in persons; (3) the applicant has complied with all reasonable requests for assistance by authorities, unless the applicant is under the age of 18; (4) the applicant would suffer extreme hardship involving unusual and severe harm upon removal.

1. I Have Been A Victim of Severe Form of Trafficking in Persons

I travelled to the United States, from Honduras in [REDACTED] of this year (2013). My guide, who I later found out belonged to the Gulf Cartel, kept me against my will at the first of many holding houses. While in Mexico, the Gulf Cartel forced me to work by unloading large black bags from pickup trucks that belonged to the cartel. The cartel members beat and torture people who refused to do the work. My captors then smuggled me into the United States. When we arrived to [REDACTED], Texas, the cartel forced me to carry a heavy black backpack to [REDACTED], Texas. I was never told what was inside. I never looked in it or asked questions about it for fear of what they may do. I had to walk for two days carrying the cartel's backpack with other captives. Armed cartel members guarded us at all times until we arrived at [REDACTED]. I had no option but to do what I was told. Since the armed cartel members were always guarding me, I was not able to escape.

2. I Am Physically Present In The U.S. On Account of Trafficking In Persons

My captors, the Gulf Cartel, kidnapped me and held me against my will in [REDACTED] Mexico. In Mexico, they forced me to work for them unloading black bags from pickup trucks and put them in a room in the holding house where they kept me and their other victims. The cartel beat, tortured and killed those who refused to do as they were told. The cartel members treated me very badly, and repeatedly beat and threatened me. My captors then smuggled me across the

border into the U.S., and forced me to work for them. In [REDACTED] Texas a member of the Gulf Cartel gave me a black backpack that weighed about 40 pounds. The cartel members told me to take the backpack to [REDACTED] Texas. I did so against my will because I knew that I would be tortured or killed if I refused. I walked for two days, under the constant watch of armed cartel members. From there, the cartel held me captive in [REDACTED] until they loaded me into a van and told me they would drive me to my uncle's place. While we were in [REDACTED], police stopped our van and apprehended us.

3. I Am Under the Age of 18 Years Old and Have Complied With All Reasonable Request for Assistance by Authorities

I am currently 17 years old and therefore am not required to submit the I-914 Supplement B, Declaration of Law Enforcement Officer for Victim of Trafficking in Persons. Nevertheless, I did comply with all reasonable requests for information. While I was still being held captive by the cartel in a van, [REDACTED] police stopped us. The police arrested the driver and turned me and several others over to immigration. I was too afraid to tell the police and immigration officers about the trafficking because the driver was in custody with us and I believe he worked for the Gulf Cartel. I thought if I told the police and the driver overheard me I could be in danger of being tortured and/or killed. I was only in ICE detention for 6 or 7 hours before I was transferred to the custody of the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) for being an unaccompanied alien child. At the ORR facility of [REDACTED] in Virginia, I told my therapist, my ORR Case Manager, and an attorney from a non-profit legal service provider who visited me about the trafficking I suffered. I received a DHHS Eligibility Letter for Victims of Trafficking in Persons.

4. I Will Suffer Extreme Hardship Involving Unusual and Severe Harm Upon Removal

I know that if I am removed from the U.S., that the gangs in Honduras will kill me. Prior to coming to the United States, members of the 18th Street Gang threatened and harassed me. The 18th Street Gang was pressuring me to join them. When I refused to join the gang, they beat me up and blew marijuana smoke in my face. This happened to me several times. The 18th Street Gang continued to harass me and follow me for about a year. One time, I was trying to escape the gang beating and they cut my hand with a knife. I still have the scar on my hand from that attack. When gang members asked me one final time to join their gang and I refused, they threatened me with death. As a result, I lived in fear and was forced into hiding since I knew they would hurt me if they ever saw me. Where I live in Honduras, the town of [REDACTED], almost every young man is in the gang, and the gang is everywhere in Honduras. There is nowhere that I can go to be safe, and to keep my family safe. I left Honduras because I am not ready to die and I want a chance at a new life.

In addition, as a victim of trafficking, I experienced and continue to experience extreme emotional suffering. I continue to suffer psychological trauma because of what the cartel made me do. While in ORR custody I met with psychologists who helped me with therapy, to deal with the emotional trauma. I plan to continue seeking counseling in [REDACTED]. I know that if I return to Honduras, I will suffer extreme hardship because I will not have access to proper counseling treatment to help me cope with the trauma I have suffered.

Part C. Question 1

On my way to the United States, a member of the Gulf Cartel under the guise of being a "guide" took me from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] Mexico. In [REDACTED] I was held captive in a *bodega*, also known as a holding house, controlled by the Gulf Cartel and forced to work. The work included unloading pickup trucks filled with large black bags. I was held in this house for 18 days. The cartel then smuggled me into the United States and took me to another holding house in [REDACTED], Texas where I was held captive for several days. From there, the cartel took me to the desert outside of [REDACTED] Texas and gave me a black backpack that was very heavy. They ordered me to take it by foot to [REDACTED] Texas and hand it off to another member of the cartel. I was under the control and guarded by members of the Gulf Cartel the whole journey, including the walk from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] Texas. While under the control of the Gulf Cartel, I saw firsthand how they beat, torture, and kill people who refuse to follow their commands. I unwillingly obeyed their orders because I knew that if I did not, they would torture and/or kill me, and I was unable to run away from them. Please see my personal statement and supporting documents for further detail.

Part C. Question 2

Since I am under the age of 18 years old I am therefore not required to submit the I-194 Supplement B, Declaration of Law Enforcement Officer for Victim of Trafficking in Persons. Nevertheless, I did comply with all reasonable requests for information and reported the crime to the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) case manager, and therapist as soon as I felt safe to disclose the information. Please see my Department of Health and Human Services Eligibility Letter for Victims of Trafficking in Persons in the Supplemental Documents.

Part C. Question 3

I fled Honduras because I was being threatened by members of the 18th Street Gang. Upon arriving in [REDACTED] Mexico, I fell into the hands of a guide who turned out to be a member of the Gulf Cartel. This man forced me to work for the cartel. I was held against my will for 18 days in a holding house in Mexico and ordered to unload black bags from pickup trucks. I do not know what was in the bags. I was afraid for my life because I saw firsthand that the cartel members tortured and killed people who do not follow their orders. After 18 days, my captors smuggled me into the U.S. After crossing the US-Mexico border, they held me captive in a *bodega* for several days then forced me to carry a heavy black backpack. The backpack weight about 40 pounds and I had to carry it through the desert guarded by an armed cartel member all the way to [REDACTED], Texas. This took 2 days. Throughout my whole journey I was under threat and was guarded by armed men. I was unable to escape from the control of the Gulf Cartel until immigration caught us. Please see my personal statement and supporting documents for further details.

Part C. Question 4

Due to the emotional trauma I suffered because I am a victim of trafficking, I have had a hard time dealing with what happened to me. While in the custody of ORR I was receiving medical treatment from my psychologist who has been helping me with dealing with the trauma I endured. If I am removed back to Honduras, I will not be able to continue with the counseling to help me cope with the victimization I endured. In Honduras there is a lack of resources for people who have been victims of trafficking, resources that I need. Additionally, I am scared to go back home to Honduras because I am afraid I will be killed by gang members from the 18th Street Gang. In Honduras, the 18th Street Gang has threatened me; they told me that I have to join their gang. They have beaten me up on more than two occasions and cut my hand with a knife during one of those beatings. The 18th Street Gang recruits heavily from my town, [REDACTED]. In [REDACTED] most of the young boys belong to that gang, and those who refuse to join them are often beaten and/or killed. On more than one occasion, the 18th Street Gang members followed and harassed me on my way home from work, and they beat me up and stole my money. The beatings and threats became so severe that I was forced into hiding. For over a month I could not leave my home. If I go back to Honduras I believe the 18th Street Gang will threaten, beat and possibly kill me for refusing to join them. Please see my personal statement and supporting documents for further details.

Part C. Question 5

When I was detained by immigration, I was too afraid to talk to the police or ICE about what the traffickers forced me to do. When I was interviewed by the police after our van was stopped driving through [REDACTED], I was detained along with my driver who I believe worked for the Gulf Cartel. I was afraid that if I said something in front of the driver the cartel would find out and hurt me and/or my family. I was placed in the custody of Office of Refugee and Resettlement (ORR) and sent to the juvenile detention center, "[REDACTED]," in [REDACTED]. I informed ORR about the trafficking and the forced labor that I endured. I reported it to my therapist and my ORR case manager. Please see my personal statement and supporting documents for further details.

Part C. Question 7

I did not report the information to Federal, State or local law enforcement authorities; however I did reported the crime to my case manager at the [REDACTED] Facility, and therapist as soon as I felt safe to disclose the information. Please see my Eligibility Letter for Victims of Trafficking in Persons from the Department of Health and Human Services in the Supplemental Documents. If the Federal, State or local law enforcement authorities ask for my assistance in the investigation or prosecution I will be more than willing to assist them.

Part C. Question 9

On my way to the U.S. my guide, who I later found out was a member of the Gulf Cartel, forced me to work for the cartel when I was in [REDACTED] Mexico. I was held against my will for 18 days in a holding house in Mexico and forced to work for the Gulf Cartel unloading black bags from pickup trucks. I do not know what was in the bags because no one told me and I could not ask for

fear of being beaten. I was afraid for my life the entire time I was held captive by the Gulf Cartel. My captors smuggled me into the U.S. and after crossing the border they took me to [REDACTED], Texas they held me captive for several days. From there, members of the Gulf Cartel forced me and six others to each carry heavy black backpacks. My backpack weighed about 40 pounds and I was forced to carry it by foot all the way from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED], Texas. I was guarded by an armed member of the Gulf Cartel during this walk. We walked for 2 days until we arrived to [REDACTED]. Throughout my whole journey I was under threat and was guarded by armed men. I was unable to escape from them. Please see my personal statement and supporting documents for further details.

On [REDACTED] 2013 I was detained by ICE near [REDACTED]. I was identified as an unaccompanied alien child and I was turned over to the Office of Refugee Resettlement shelter, in [REDACTED]

I received an "Eligibility Letter" from the Department of Health and Human Services under section 107 (b) (1) (A) of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000. As such I am eligible to receive benefits and services under any Federal or State program or activity funded or administered by any Federal agency. I am in the process of applying for these benefits. Part D. Question 9

I was held against my will by members of the Gulf Cartel in [REDACTED] Mexico. While in the cartel's custody, I was held in a room in an immigrant holding house. I was locked up in a room for 18 days and I could hear the Gulf Cartel members beat and torture a young man for over 20 minutes. The next morning I saw the head of a decapitated young man lying on the street. I was told that head belonged to the young man who I heard being tortured in the room next to mine. When the cartel members forced me to work for them in [REDACTED] one of the immigrants with me refused to work for them. I saw the cartel members beat him badly for having refused their orders. From then on I knew that their threats were serious. Once in the US, I was forced to carry a backpack from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED], Texas. After this, the cartel members took me to a third immigrant holding house against my will in [REDACTED] Texas. There I was beaten with a wooden board on my back and upper body and locked in a shoe closet for over 8 hours. Please see attached declaration and other supporting documents for further details.

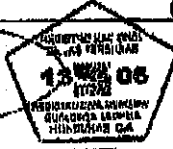

DECLARATION OF APPLICANT

I, [REDACTED], A# [REDACTED], currently residing at [REDACTED], declare the following:

1. I was born on [REDACTED] in the town of [REDACTED], [REDACTED], Honduras. I am currently 17 years old.
2. I lived with my mother, [REDACTED], my father, [REDACTED], and my four (4) siblings [REDACTED] (age 13), [REDACTED] (age 11), [REDACTED] (age 4), and [REDACTED] (age 2). I am the oldest of my siblings. I have always had a great relationship with my siblings and my parents. I have good memories spending time with my dad. When I did not have to go to work, I would go out and play soccer with my friends or with my father. My father and I are very competitive and we loved to play against each other.
3. I attended school until I was 13 years old. I completed the 6th grade. I was unable to continue my studies because my family did not have enough money to continue sending me to school, and my younger siblings needed to finish their schooling. After leaving school at the age of 13, I started working with my father farming corn and beans. We rented a small plot of land and I would wake up at six in the morning and work until four in the afternoon. After work I played soccer with my friends or with my dad and then headed home. I had dinner with my family and went to bed around eight at night. My village has limited electricity and my house does not have any electricity, so we would go to bed early.
4. About a year ago, I was playing soccer with my cousin, [REDACTED]. He approached some gang members who belonged to the 18th Street Gang to purchase some marijuana. My cousin liked to smoke marijuana. Shortly after that day, I was on my way home by myself after playing soccer. Some members of the 18th Street Gang surrounded and overpowered me. They attacked me and pinned my arms behind my back. They blew marijuana smoke in my face and forced me to inhale it. They threatened me by saying I had to join their gang. I refused because I do not agree with what the gangs do such as selling and using drugs and promoting violence. Because I refused to join, the gang members beat me up and punched me in the face. After this the 18th street gang began threatening me and pressuring me to join. When they saw me on the streets they would beat me up, I always tried to run away from them. On one occasion as I tried to get away from them one of the gang members cut my hand with a knife. I still have a scar on my hand from that altercation. On two more occasions after this attack, the gang members threatened me demanding I join. Each time they beat me up and robbed me of the little money I had made from working in the fields. The situation worsened and the gang members warned me that I needed to watch my back because they were going to hurt me or kill me when I least expected it. The gang members continued to harass me throughout the year. They followed me when I would go to work or go play soccer. The harassment and threats got so bad that I could no longer leave my house. For about one year, I kept receiving threats that they were going to hurt me if I did not join the gang. I became very

scared for my life. The 18th Street Gang is everywhere in Honduras and they can find me wherever I go in Honduras. My parents and I decided the only option was for me to come to the United States. It was a tough decision because I did not want to leave my family behind.

5. On [REDACTED] 2013, I left my home in Honduras and headed north towards the United States. A friend of mine put me in contact with a *coyote*, also known as a guide, and my father took out a loan to pay for my trip. We paid a total of [REDACTED] USD to get me from Honduras to [REDACTED]. The plan was that once in [REDACTED] my uncle would have to pay an additional [REDACTED] for me to go to [REDACTED]. A couple days after leaving my home in Honduras, my guide arranged for me to hide in a trailer truck until I arrived to [REDACTED]. I was in this truck for about 18 hours. In [REDACTED] my guide passed me off to another man who went by the nickname "[REDACTED]", "[REDACTED]". [REDACTED] was a [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] took me from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] Mexico by bus. This was when my journey took an unexpected turn for the worse.
6. When we arrived to [REDACTED] [REDACTED] took me to a *bodega*, a holding house for immigrants. I was locked up in this *bodega* for about 18 days. Once there, [REDACTED] told me that he worked for the Gulf Cartel and the *bodega* belonged to and was run by the cartel. I was constantly guarded by armed cartel members. Other men in the *bodega* also told me they were members of the Gulf Cartel. The *bodega* was very old and run down, it looked half built. There were several armed men guarding the *bodega*. Every now and then other heavily armed men with big guns would come into the *bodega* and look around, but I never knew what they were looking for. Other people who were held captive with me told me that my guide, [REDACTED] was always armed as well.
7. In this *bodega* there was a total of about 15 – 20 other immigrants who were captive with me. There were two holding rooms in the *bodega* where they kept people locked up. I and one other person were placed in a room by ourselves. All of the other people were placed in the second room. I do not know why we separated from everyone else. I was rarely given food; most of my trip I went hungry. Whenever I did get food, it was a small portion, and only once per day. I was only ever taken out of my room when the cartel members forced me to work for them. Every other day, two or three pickup trucks would come to the *bodega* full of black bags which we were ordered to unload. The bags were different sizes, shapes and weight. We were threatened by the cartel members and told that if we resisted unloading the bags they would beat and kill us. Every morning when the pickup trucks came, the cartel members would line us up and a man would choose eight to ten of us to unload the bags that day. I tried to keep my head down and not talk so that they would not pick me, but I was frequently chosen to work to unload the trucks. One time I saw a man refuse to help and the cartel members beat him badly. After that, no one refused and no one asked questions. I knew that the cartel members would beat me and possibly kill me if I resisted their orders. I had no choice but to do what I was told. I unloaded bags from the trucks and we were ordered to put the bags in a room on

[REDACTED] the bottom floor of the house. After we were done unloading, the room was locked and no one was allowed inside.

8. I am still dealing with the trauma of being in that bodega. While I was there, I saw and heard terrible things. I saw the cartel members severely beat up a man. Another time, at night, I heard them torture and kill a young boy in the room next to me. I could hear his screams through the walls; it lasted for 20 to 30 minutes until everything went silent. The next day I saw a decapitated head outside on the street. I assumed it was the head of the boy in the room next to me. The other people locked up with me told me that a friend of our coyote, [REDACTED], was the one who killed that young boy.
9. I could also hear people in the bodega next to ours crying out for help. One of the immigrants in my bodega told me that they take people into the bodega next door and they never come out because they kill them in there.
10. Around [REDACTED] 2013 the cartel members including [REDACTED], who had his gun on him, put me in a car and drove to the border with a group of about 16 other immigrants. Our armed captors demanded that we cross the river into the U.S. on an inflatable raft. Once we crossed, my group walked for 2 hours until we arrived to [REDACTED] Texas. [REDACTED] took me to a new bodega where I waited until someone came for me. This bodega also belonged to the Gulf Cartel. We arrived to the bodega late at night but I noticed the house was not in the city; it was located in an isolated area. [REDACTED] locked me in a room with about 30 other people and I waited, hoping this would be better than the last bodega.
11. The cartel kept me locked in that bodega for about 7 or 8 days with little food and water. Eventually a new man came who was tall, skinny and Mexican. He ordered me, another juvenile, and four adults to get in a car with him. I never knew his name or his nickname. Since he worked with [REDACTED] I was too scared to ask questions. I believe he also worked with the Gulf Cartel and was armed. This new guide drove us to the edge of the city of [REDACTED]. When we got there he instructed us to get out of the car. There was another skinny, tall, clean cut man with a very dark pickup truck waiting for us. It was late at night, so I could not tell if this man had a weapon. The man with the pickup truck had 5 black backpacks in the back of his truck. We were ordered to carry these backpacks and travel by foot to [REDACTED]. I unwillingly took the backpack. Again I had no choice but to comply because I believed he was also working for the cartels and I knew he would beat me or kill me if I refused. The backpack was very heavy, and weighed about 40 pounds. Against my back I could feel that there were several things inside the backpack, but I never looked inside it. I do not think anyone in our group ever opened the backpacks because we were scared. We walked for 2 days until we arrived at the outskirts of [REDACTED] Texas, throughout the whole walk we were guarded by the cartel member who picked me up from the bodega and he was armed. We were never given food during our walk, only a little bit of water to keep us going. The backpack was very heavy and hurt my back. The straps of the backpack cut into my shoulders. The constant rubbing of the backpack against my shoulders and back left my skin raw. We rarely rested. Only if someone fell far behind did the rest of the group stop to wait for them. I tried my best to keep up with the group. In the desert, close to [REDACTED] another cartel member was

waiting for us with a different pickup truck. He took the backpacks away from us, put them in the back of his truck, and drove us to [REDACTED] to another bodega.

12. The bodega in [REDACTED] was a small house inside the city; there were at least three men there with guns. I believe this was another bodega under the control of the Gulf Cartel. In this house the cartel kept about 35 people. We were about 10 people in each room. I was kept in this bodega for 3 more days. When we arrived, the man who drove us said we could take a shower. I had not taken a shower in a long time so I was the first to do so. When I came out of the shower one of the armed cartel members yelled at me. He said he did not give me permission to take a shower. He began to beat me badly with a flat piece of wood. He hit me all along my upper body and then said I had to be punished. He locked me up in a shoe closet for 8 hours. It smelled so bad in there that I vomited due to the smell. I was never given food or water while I was locked up. When they finally let me out of the closet I was locked up in a bigger room for about two days. It took a week for the pain to go away. While staying at this bodega I witnessed members from the Gulf Cartel forcibly take two young girls from my group. They took the girls away screaming and we never saw them again.

13. After 3 days at that bodega, I also taken to a second bodega, also in [REDACTED] but this one was outside of the city and it smelled bad. There were about 20 to 30 people in this bodega and it was guarded by armed men. I was told I had to wait there, I did not know why. I was hopeful that I would only have to remain there until my [REDACTED] paid the Gulf Cartel the ransom money for my release. I later found out that the cartel never contacted my [REDACTED] for payment. I was kept locked up in a room at that house for 8 days again with little food and water.

14. Around [REDACTED], 2013 at around 9:00 pm, the guide put me and 17 others in a van. I was told that they would finally take me to my [REDACTED] in [REDACTED]. We left [REDACTED] and drove for about 27 hours. We drove to [REDACTED] where we dropped off one younger man. I asked if I would be next and I was told that they would drop me off later, but that they were taking the rest of us to [REDACTED]. I did not understand why. We drove through [REDACTED] and we were close to the city of [REDACTED] police pulled our driver over. I am not sure why, but I was scared. The police arrested our driver, called immigration, and we were taken to a jail. I was in an office for several hours. The officer asked me for my name and age and where my uncle lived. I gave him all my information but was still too scared to tell him what happened to me on my journey here because our driver was detained with us. Since [REDACTED], I had been under the control of the Gulf Cartel. I was pretty sure that my driver was also a member of the cartels, so I was too scared to say anything in front of him. If the cartel found out I told the police, I was sure they would torture and/or kill me or maybe even hurt my family. After I signed many papers I was sent with two other children to a juvenile immigration shelter that was close by called "[REDACTED]" in [REDACTED].

15. I was detained at the immigration shelter in [REDACTED], from [REDACTED] 2013 until [REDACTED], 2013. I still remember my first night at the shelter. It was the first time I had a good night sleep and where I felt safe in over a year. At [REDACTED] they treated

me wonderfully. I never knew someone other than a parent could treat you that well. It was not until I was at [REDACTED] that I felt comfortable disclosing what happened to me on my journey to the U.S. I told my case manager, my therapist and the attorney who came to visit me. I told them how I was forced to work and that the whole time I believed that my life was in danger because I was under the control of the Gulf Cartel who are very bad men.

16. I talked to my therapist at [REDACTED] weekly to help me deal with the trauma I have experienced. I have had nightmares where I relive what happened to me. Whenever I had these nightmares, I told my therapist about it and she helped me by giving me exercises to work through these issues. I try not to think about my journey to the U.S. I have worked hard to block it out of my mind. I am very angry and frustrated for what the guides and the cartel members did to me. The coping mechanisms my therapist gave me have been working really well to help me manage these emotions.
17. I am very afraid to return to Honduras. I know that if I have to return I will again suffer at the hands of the gang members. The gang will torture me and may kill me. It was a difficult decision to leave Honduras because I miss my family very much. This is the first time I have ever been away from them. However, it was either leave Honduras or be killed.
18. In spite of all the challenges that I have faced, I have worked hard to make the best out of the situation. At [REDACTED] I attended classes and I loved all of them. I cannot even choose a favorite one. I love that I am back in school learning English, math, science, and history among other subjects. When I was leaving Honduras, I hoped for a better future in the U.S. I never imagined that I would have the opportunity to go back to school. Now, I want to finish my schooling and then I hope I can get permission to work. The staff at [REDACTED] helped me transition from a terrible moment in my life and showed me how to make the best of every moment. By going to school, learning English and other things, I have a chance to start a new life.
19. If I am given the opportunity to stay in the United States I would be very happy. I would take full advantage of the privileges given to me. I am now living with my [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and I have plans to finish my studies and achieve a high school diploma. I have already started taking GED classes, I really like my teacher and so far I have learned a lot. I have also joined a local soccer team and we are playing in a city tournament, we already won our first game. In my free time I like to go out and explore the woods behind my house, or I go to the soccer field and play soccer with my [REDACTED]. My dream is to become a carpenter and build things with my own hands. I have always loved studying carpentry and the thought of being able to start my own carpentry business would make me very happy. I would also like to save up money to maybe go to college one day and study architecture. I have always been fascinated by building. I have always dreamed that someday I would be an architect and design a unique building of my own, and hopefully, this dream of mine will become a reality.

Alien Registration: This copy of the Notice to Appear served upon you is evidence of your alien registration while you are under removal proceedings. You are required to carry it with you at all times.

Representation: If you so choose, you may be represented in this proceeding, at no expense to the Government, by an attorney or other individual authorized and qualified to represent persons before the Executive Office for Immigration Review, pursuant to 8 CFR 3.16. Unless you so request, no hearing will be scheduled earlier than ten days from the date of this notice, to allow you sufficient time to secure counsel. A list of qualified attorneys and organizations who may be available to represent you at no cost will be provided with this notice.

Conduct of the hearing: At the time of your hearing, you should bring with you any affidavits or other documents, which you desire to have considered in connection with your case. If you wish to have the testimony of any witnesses considered, you should arrange to have such witnesses present at the hearing.

At your hearing you will be given the opportunity to admit or deny any or all of the allegations in the Notice to Appear and that you are inadmissible or removable on the charges contained in the Notice to Appear. You will have an opportunity to present evidence on your own behalf, to examine any evidence presented by the Government, to object, on proper legal grounds, to the receipt of evidence and to cross examine any witnesses presented by the Government. At the conclusion of your hearing, you have a right to appeal an adverse decision by the immigration judge.

You will be advised by the immigration judge before whom you appear of any relief from removal for which you may appear eligible including the privilege of departure voluntarily. You will be given a reasonable opportunity to make any such application to the immigration judge.

Failure to appear: You are required to provide the DHS, in writing, with your full mailing address and telephone number. You must notify the Immigration Court immediately by using Form EOIR-33 whenever you change your address or telephone number during the course of this proceeding. You will be provided with a copy of this form. Notices of hearing will be mailed to this address. If you do not submit Form EOIR-33 and do not otherwise provide an address at which you may be reached during proceedings, then the Government shall not be required to provide you with written notice of your hearing. If you fail to attend the hearing at the time and place designated on this notice, or any date and time later directed by the Immigration Court, a removal order may be made by the immigration judge in your absence, and you may be arrested and detained by the DHS.

Mandatory Duty to Surrender for Removal: If you become subject to a final order of removal, you must surrender for removal to one of the offices listed in 8 CFR 241.16(a). Specific addresses on locations for surrender can be obtained from your local DHS office or over the internet at <http://www.ice.gov/about/dm/contact.htm>. You must surrender within 30 days from the date the order becomes administratively final, unless you obtain an order from a Federal court, immigration court, or the Board of Immigration Appeals staying execution of the removal order. 4. Photographs and Videotapes.

The caregiver may take photographs and record videotapes of the child for the child's personal use and for purposes of identification. The caregiver, however, must not release any photographs or videotapes of the child for public use without ORR's prior written permission.

5. Medical Care.

The caregiver may consent to the child's medical, dental, and mental health care as specified in Attachment A, Authorization to Consent to Medical, Dental, and Mental Health Care. The caregiver may receive, review and maintain all of the child's medical, dental, and mental health records in a separate medical file.

6. Files/Confidentiality.

All records maintained by the caregiver in reference to the child are considered to be ORR records. Under penalty of law, the caregiver must not release information about the child to anyone without prior authorization of ORR, except as specified below (18. U.S.C. 279 (g)(2)):

- a) The Caregiver may provide information about the child to the child's educational program, medical, mental health, dental, and other service providers to the extent that the information is needed for the child's education, recreation, social development, medical, dental, or mental health treatment.
- b) The caregiver must give ORR and its designees, as directed by ORR, unrestricted access to information about the child at all times.
- c) All file information maintained under grants with the Federal government are the property of the Federal government and are fully accessible to ORR/DCS, or any of their duly authorized representatives, in accordance with applicable federal law, regulations, and OMB circulars. The records should be retained in accordance with

these applicable laws, regulations, and OMB circulars.

7. Contact with the Family.

The caregiver may authorize the child to participate in routine school programs as well as social and extracurricular activities that do not involve an unusual risk of injury to the child, unless otherwise specified by ORR. Please refer to ORR's written guidance on Incident/Escapes Procedures to minimize risk.

8. School Programs and Extracurricular Activities.

The caregiver must permit the child and the child's family (as well as other individuals who are significant to the child) to maintain contact through direct visitation, telephone calls, mail, and gifts under the terms and conditions specified by ORR in the ORR DCS Procedures Manual and the Flores Agreement.

9. Reason for Placement.

An unaccompanied minor who meets the definition of an unaccompanied alien child, 6. U.S.C. 279 (g)(2), and is in federal custody by reason of his or her immigration status.

10. Time in Care

ORR understands that the caregivers responsibility for said child will terminate when said child leaves the caregivers program.

11. Financial.

ORR agrees to provide financially for the care of said child according to the financial agreement between ORR and caregiver.


12. Restraints.

The caregiver must exhaust preventative, de-escalative, and less restrictive techniques before it uses any type of restraint. Should physical restraint be necessary for the safety of said child or others, the caregiver must use behavior intervention techniques approved by ORR. All use of restraints must be justified and documented.

[REDACTED] planned his trip to the US. He says he borrowed [REDACTED] from his father's friend and does not have to pay it back immediately. He says that neither he nor his family have been threatened for repayment of the loan. [REDACTED] said that he will work to help his father pay back the money. During initial clinical assessment and follow up session with Lead clinician [REDACTED] and clinician [REDACTED], [REDACTED] reported that sometime in [REDACTED] 2013 during his journey to the US, members from Cartel del Golfo carrying weapons, forced him to unload black bags from trucks by threatening to hit him and lock him inside a closet if he refused. This occurred in a bodega safe house in [REDACTED] Mexico, and he was forced to unload these bags from trucks every two days, for 15 days. He reported unloading these bags from 2 to 3 trucks each time and taking approximately two hours per day to unload all bags. He denied knowing what was inside these bags. [REDACTED] never received payment for doing this as he was forced and threatened by the cartel. He reported that some were heavy and others lighter and of different shapes and sizes. He also reported that during

his stay in [REDACTED] he could hear from this bodega people crying out for help from a different bodega. Two days after this incident, he observed a human head of a young boy in the streets. Other immigrants in his group informed him that their coyote was the responsible one of the death of this young boy. Then, [REDACTED] reported being moved from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] and during his journey to the US, he was forced by the coyotes to hand carry a backpack. [REDACTED] indicated that he did not know what was inside the backpack and when he asked, the coyotes became angry and threatened to kill him. [REDACTED] said that during the trip he never used alcohol or drugs and he was never sexually abused.

[REDACTED] is doing well in science. He has done all that has been asked of him. This week he worked on new vocabulary related to stars and planets. He also appears to really enjoy science and asks many questions related to the topics.

[REDACTED] is doing well in English class this week. He volunteers often and can use new vocabulary to write sentences in English with support. [REDACTED] is hand working and continue to make steady progress in math. He is active the entire class period doing his assignment. This week he learned the circumference and area of a circle. He is completing all his homework and assignments. [REDACTED] had a good week in World History. [REDACTED] has taken a leadership role in the classroom. He continually vocalizes his thoughts and opinions. He was able to inform staff about multiple civil wars as the class discussed the Roman civil war that took place in 48 B.C.E.

[REDACTED] is doing well in science. This week he learned about our solar system with emphasis on the inner planets. He has no behavior issues in science class. [REDACTED] is making steady progress in English class. He does well working with support. This week he was able to use new vocabulary to complete sentences and practiced applying standard rules for capitalization to a paragraph. He volunteers often and works well with a group. [REDACTED] continue to put effort in his math work. This week he learned the addition of integers on a number line, multiplication and division of integers and Order of operations (PEMDAS). He is completing his homework and assignments with 90 percent accuracy. [REDACTED] had a good week in World History. He participates in class frequently and appears interested in Rome and the 1st Punic Wars. [REDACTED] volunteered multiple answers as the class discussed battles between Rome and Carthage. [REDACTED] has also been using more English language vocabulary. He is a very intelligent young man.

He continued to work in his journal improving his sentence writing and spelling skills. The journal questions included critical thinking questions that would promote deep thinking on the students' part. The class continued to work with shopping scenarios and conducted verbal exercises pertaining to different situations through shopping. The class was involved in a Mother's Day project where they had to make cards for a mother at [REDACTED] who has had a significant impact on them since they have been here.

He learned to use footwear words and their use and effect: He participated in conversations pertaining to the use of footwear terms. He also continued with journal writing and answering daily prompts in complete sentences. Pronouns were reviewed. The difference between subject and object pronouns were explored. This week he participated in class activities and learned the literary terms: character, character traits, plot and fiction. He was able to apply these terms to complete a literary analysis of a short reading passage. [REDACTED] had a fun week and he is doing a great job in his math class.
